

AVID S. REYNOLDS is one of the most accomplished historians and literary critics in the field of American Studies today. The author of eight major biographical and critical studies and the editor of seven more, his books treat iconic American figures such as Walt Whitman, John Brown, and Harriet

Beecher Stowe. He has been honored with numerous awards for his works, including the prestigious Bancroft Prize in American history for his book *Walt Whitman's America* (1995). He will speak on his most recent book *Mightier than the Sword: Uncle Tom's Cabin and the Battle for America* (2011), which has been called a "bravura work...[a] cultural history of assured mastery."

Reynolds is a graduate of Amherst College (B.A.) and the University of California, Berkeley (Ph.D.). He has taught American literature and American Studies at Northwestern University, Barnard College, New York University, Rutgers University, Baruch College, and the Sorbonne-Paris III. Since 2006, he has been a Distinguished Professor at the Graduate Center of the City University of New York. A regular contributor to *The New York Times Book Review*, he has been interviewed more than eighty times on radio and television.
