



## ABOUT LLOYD KRAMER

Lloyd Kramer, an award-winning scholar and teacher, is the Dean E. Smith Distinguished Term Professor of History and chair of the history department at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. His research and teaching focus on modern European history with an emphasis on nineteenth-century France.

Kramer is the author of Lafayette in Two Worlds: Public Cultures and Personal Identities in an Age of Revolutions (1996), which received the Gilbert Chinard Prize from the American Society for French Historical Studies and the Annibel Jenkins Biography Prize from the American Society for Eighteenth-Century Studies. His widely-praised study of Lafayette is not a traditional biography, but a cross-cultural examination of themes that help to define the man whose public career straddled two continents and more than half a century.

Kramer's other publications include Threshold of a New World: Intellectuals and the Exile Experience in Paris, 1830-1848 (1988), and Nationalism: Political Cultures in Europe and America, 1775-1865 (1998). He is also a co-author of two textbooks, A History of the Modern World (10th edition, 2007) and A Companion to Western Historical Thought (2002).

At UNC, Kramer has been honored with two awards for undergraduate teaching. He has also taught at Northwestern, Stanford, and Cornell Universities. He received his Ph.D. in European intellectual history from Cornell University, an M.A. in history from Boston College, and a B.A. from Maryville College.
